

Who Am I?



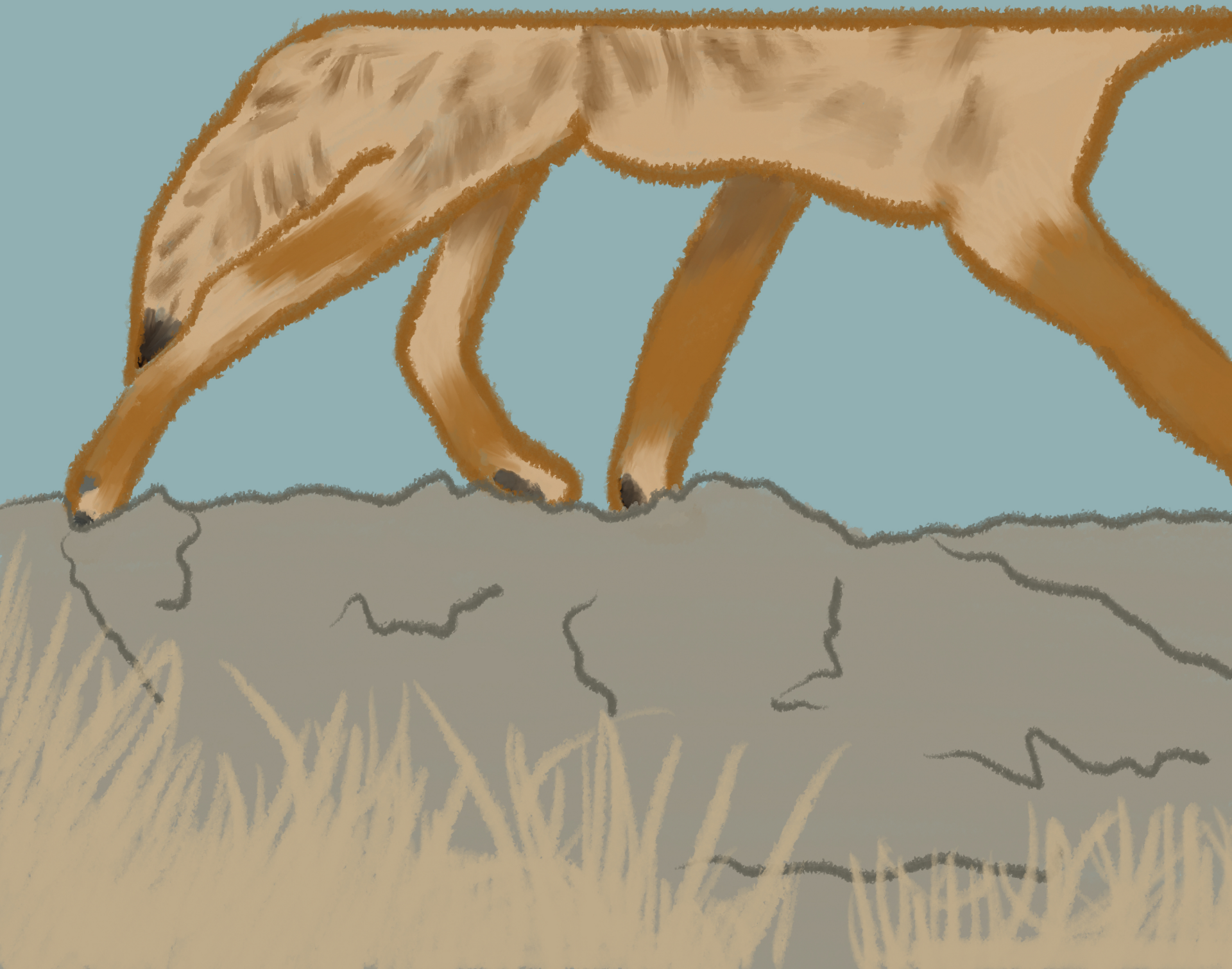
Who am I?

Who am I?

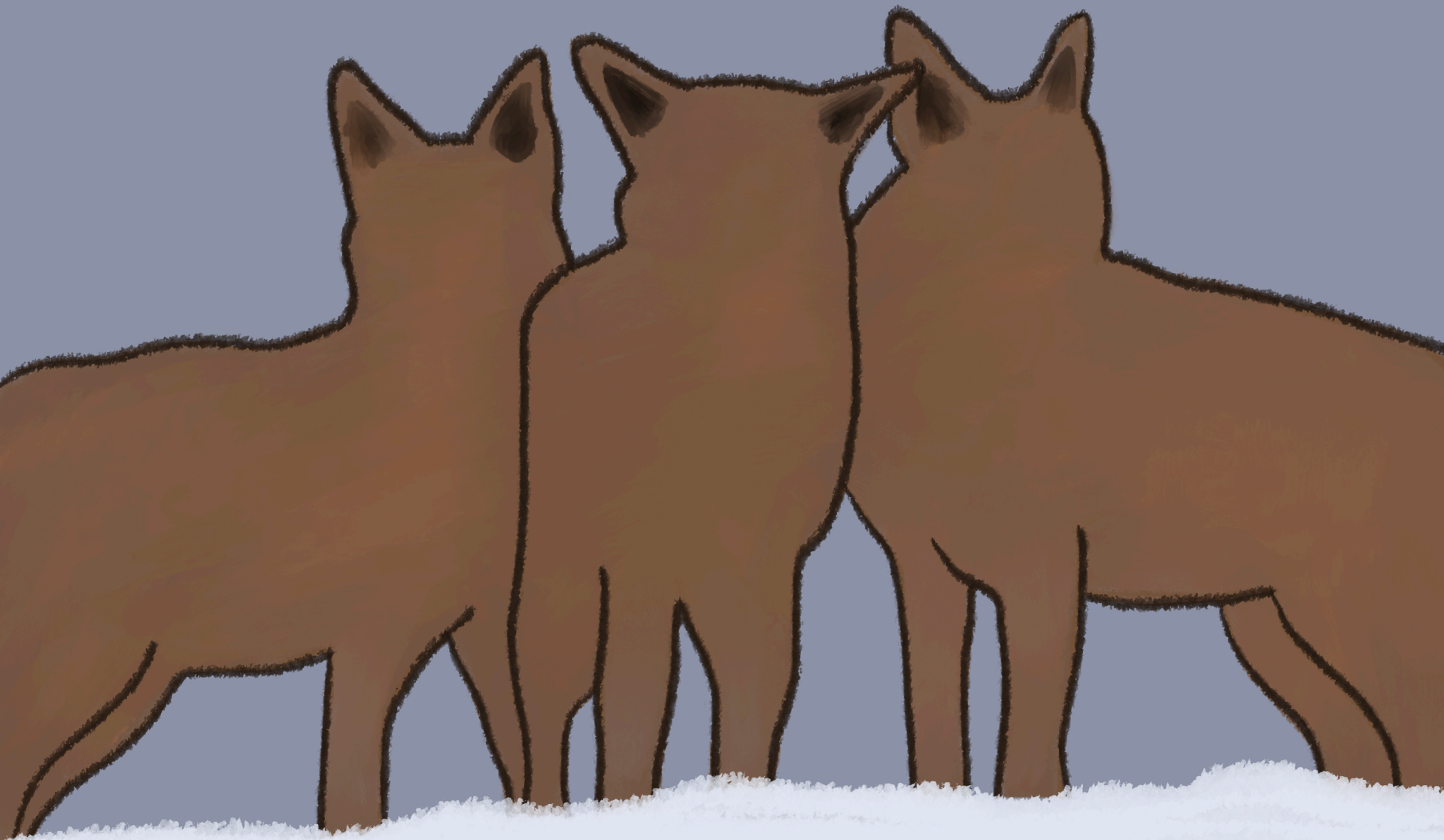


My eyes are yellow,

Who am I?

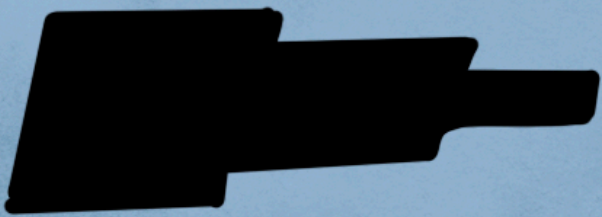


I often travel in a

Coyote is often depicted as clever, a trickster, playful, and a creator. It is believed that coyote made Willamette Falls specifically to benefit Tribal peoples.
